
Coffee and Conversation



After lengthy delays, in 1912 the progressive City of Prince Albert finally embarked on the construction of what had to become the first hydroelectric power dam in the Province of Saskatchewan. Unfortunately, a multitude of problems arose during the building and in the summer of 1913, all work ceased, never to be taken in hand again. For the next fifty years the city bravely managed to pay off the debt on its failed project.
